**Message from the Manse:**

With thanks to Allan McKechnie, Elizabeth Burns, the Tuesday Discussion Group, I introduce to you Dr. Jim Taylor, a theologian and philosopher, experienced Bible translator, missionary, and pastor. He asks himself, and his readers, questions like, “Are all Bible translations created equal? Is there such a thing as a pure Bible, free from error? What does the Bible teach about itself?” This month I would like to share some of his thinking on what he believes and does not believe anymore. He writes:

“My friend and retired minister Bob Thompson described an exercise someone had recommended to him. “You put two sheets of paper up on a wall,” Bob explained. “On one sheet you list the things that you believe about God. On the second sheet you list the things you no longer believe about God.” Bob laughed. “I think the sheet with things I no longer believe would have far more items on it than things I still believe.” I tried it. Bob was right. Initially, the things I believe about God consisted of just two words. “God is.” I didn’t know how to add to that description. I could have said, perhaps, “God is love,” or “God is beauty.” I could, in fact, have added every adjective in the dictionary, and still never fully described God. Because every description limits God. It becomes a fence, a wall, a barrier. It implies that God is only this; therefore, God can’t be that. So, I settled for those two words. “God is...”

The second page was a lot easier to fill in. I suppose, at some time, I must have believed that God was an old man with a long white beard, sitting on a golden throne on a cloud, strumming on a harp, while occasionally hurling thunderbolts at the mess we humans have made here below. Did I genuinely believe that? Or did I simply reflect common preconceptions I sensed among the people I knew? I certainly don’t believe it anymore. I can be more specific. I no longer believe that God sits in judgement over us. God does not keep track of our sins and misdeeds in a giant spreadsheet. Saint Peter doesn’t sit at the Pearly Gates deciding whether we passed or failed the test

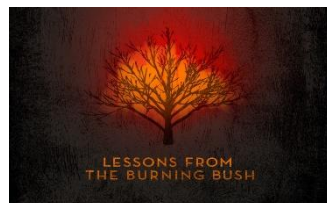

God does not reward a chosen few with abundant life, prosperity, and endless happiness. God does not play favourites. I believe that God is impartial. As one Bible verse says, "The rain falls on the just and the unjust." (I suppose that could go on the first page.) You see, I believe that God is in everything, of everything – including me. I am one of the agents through which this universal God works to evolve this world into something more kindly, more beautiful, more intelligent... But there I go again, adding adjectives. The obvious question is, if I don't believe all those traditional images of God, does that make me an atheist? No. That is why I insist that "God is." Because there is something that drives me, that motivates me, that shapes my attitudes and perspectives. I am not simply a dust ball blown around by Hamlet's 'slings and arrows of outrageous fortune.' I don't know what that 'something' is. But I do know I will spend the rest of my life to grow a closer relationship with it. God IS. That is enough for me."

Have your images of God, of hell and heaven remained the same throughout your life, or have they changed, like Jim's have? It might be a good idea to put two sheets of paper up on the wall and work out for yourself how your beliefs have changed. When God speaks to Moses from the burning bush, God says, "I AM (who I am)". Ancient Biblical wisdom is, for me, the basis to say, with Jim, "God IS". I would love to hear your thoughts!

**An article from the Christian newspaper Challenge:**

Jazz music is not everyone's first choice – it is a unique style of music. In many concerts you may actually be treated to music that no-one has ever heard before because within many jazz pieces, there is the opportunity for free expression.

It is very important to realise that this is within limits. If all the musicians playing at that moment did exactly what they wanted, you would not have music, it would just be a conglomeration of sounds. The ability of jazz musicians to play extemporaneously is in fact within strict limits. The freedom to play and experiment with the music is freedom within the bounds of the moment, the band and the music. Freedom in this life is just the same. We have the freedom to live in a relationship with God, but God does not say that our freedom has no boundaries. Life with no boundaries is like music with no boundaries. It's a disaster. Discover the freedom God has for you. A life lived to its maximum potential, but within the boundaries of God's Word to us.

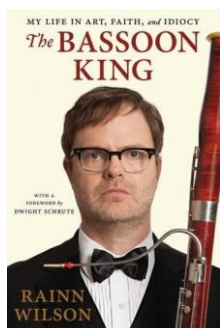


## **WESLEY MUSIC NEWS:**

**WITHOUT WATER, LIFE WOULD BE IMPOSSIBLE :**

Drinking disease-ridden water hurts tens of thousands of children in the Philippines, especially in rural areas, and millions worldwide. The impact is staggering. Already-limited incomes are stretched to breaking point because ill parents can't grow food or work. Sick children are chronically in and out of class and therefore robbed of an education. In the worst-case scenarios, water, sanitation and hygiene related illnesses take the lives of the most vulnerable, who

are usually children under five. It happens about twice every minute. Samaritan's Purse have set up a project to bring safe water to schools by installing large-scale water filters and hand-washing stations. After an enormous blue container with a bio-sand filter and a hand-washing station had been installed at one school, the principal, Mr Ramos, wrote to Samaritan's Purse. "Undeniably, without water, life would be impossible", he began, "Everyone needs safe water, clean and safe water. The presence of the large BioSand Water Filter gives delight not only to the school, teachers, parents, and learners, but to the whole community" he went on. "I cannot believe that the thing I have been dreaming of, having this kind of water facility in our school, would come into reality. I am forever grateful to Samaritan's Purse for this project and to the individuals who were instrumental in its realisation."

The individuals are the donors who give and pray so that children like Abby (below), Mr Ramos and thousands of others in the area have safe water, improved sanitation and hygiene. Work continues to bring safe water to five more schools in Mindanao giving children like Abby the chance to play, learn, grow up and become who God calls them to be.

Abby says "The safe water will help us to have good health and immunity." She dreams of one day becoming a teacher, "I want to help children" she shared.

Abby fills her container with safe, clean drinking water from school to take home to her family.
