Wesley News on Repairs and Renovations:

After years of battling their way through Mission Plans, regulations regarding historical buildings, the use of embargoed funds, finding qualified tradespeople to carry out repairs in accordance with regulations while the estimated cost ever rose whilst watching the conditions of the buildings deteriorate further, and whenever heavy rain was forecast making sure large containers were in place to catch the rainwater from the leaking roof, the Council feels as though at last a breakthrough is imminent. The Thrive team from Synod headed by Rob Douglas and Tim Fellows, made a visit a few weeks ago and with dialogue across the table instead of endless emails which never guite answered guestions clearly, the Council was assured that their Mission Plan had been approved and the embargoed funds from the sale of Norman House would be used to cover costs. Tim Fallows is an executive member of Synod , with a background in project managing, and at the meeting was able to provide useful information of how to go about dealing with the heritage situation. So far, the local architect firm H&H have been used for assistance and Tim has suggested that by liaising with both H&H and Perth architects he could assist and project manage the ongoing work from Perth. The cost of restoration is very expensive, but in addition to releasing the embargoed funds, the Synod property group will help us to apply for Heritage grants, which will assist in the total completion of the Duke St complex. Rob Douglas sympathised with the amount of time it has taken to get this far, but advised us not to get too fixed on the building difficulties and look forward as well, always on the look-out for ways we can continue to develop our mission to the wider community. In the March Magazine, Joan Wright suggested that we have a box available to collect food items to pass on to aid organisations in Albany. Wesley has their AGM scheduled for Sunday 23rd so once you have digested the above, make an effort to attend the AGM, ask questions and make some suggestions for ongoing community aid. Clare Ferry

Many thanks to all who have donated items for fund raising and items to go in the boxes this year. I have done a run through my book and honestly you are marvellous! All we need now for the boxes are some more small toys and marbles. The cheapest marbles are probably still available at the Reject Shop, Icky Finks or the Two Buck shop. You used to be able to get a pack of 100 for about \$3.50 but the price would probably be more now. We need 6 or 7 packs. We could do with some more saleable goods to sell on our next fund-raising stalls, the Scots markets on **30**th **and 31**st **May**, and the next **Bargain Bonanza** on **9**th **June**, providing you haven't completely emptied your cupboards for us already.

The article I have chosen on the work of Samaritan's Purse is on the assistance they have provided for both Israel and Gaza. I have a problem with Franklin Graham talking of the "accidental killing" of the Aid workers, when we know that 3 or 4 notifications of the route and whereabouts were given to the Israeli army, and the vehicles were clearly marked, yet they were deliberately targeted and bombed. This situation really needs our constant prayers. It is hard for us, living, as we do, in Australia, to get our heads around all this violence. It is the thousands of children who have been killed that gets to me, a stark example of "Man's inhumanity to Man" There is no check of what is really happening there, I just hope that Samaritan's Purse can really help those suffering and in need. Responding to crisis in the Middle East, May, Franklin Graham: When Hamas attacked Israel on 7th October 2023, Samaritan's Purse quickly deployed a Disaster Response Team, and we began working with dozens of church partners in Israel, as well as in Gaza and the West Bank, to provide thousands of displaced families on both sides of the conflict with food and other assistance. Now, 7 months later, we continue to support both Israelies and Palestinians impacted by the fighting. In the months since the initial attack, Samaritan's Purse has helped meet immediate food and hygiene needs for tens of thousands, with over 23,000 food vouchers distributed and 18,500 grocery bags handed out. We also airlifted 1,000 advance trauma kits for medical professionals to use in communities that are furthest from hospitals and emergency service – greatly increasing the ability for injured civilians to receive critical care. In addition, we are overseeing numerous medical clinics in the West Bank and other locations to serve vulnerable Palestinians who have lost access to healthcare since the war began.

When Hamas invaded, they targeted and destroyed ambulances. 14 ambulances of Magen David Adom, the nation's first responder service, were destroyed, and many brave medics were killed as they worked valiantly to save lives. I pledged that Samaritan's Purse would replace the ambulances and provide an additional eight that would be armoured to help protect their personnel from sniper fire. I returned to Jerusalem in January, and had the incredible privilege of dedicating fourteen new ambulances in memory of those fallen heroes. I want to thank everyone whose gifts and prayers made it possible for us to provide these resources. We couldn't do this work without faithful partners like you.

Ministering in this part of the world is particularly challenging. Its difficulties and dangers were keenly felt last month. I was deeply saddened by the deaths of seven aid workers with World Central Kitchen, including Australian Lalzawmi Francom, who were killed accidentally inside Gaza. I am very familiar with the organisation
