

History?

Sometimes a bishop, a priest, a minister... No, let's start again. Sometimes any man or woman can make a difference in someone else's life. Aspiring Jesus followers are called to commit to bring comfort, hope, light into the world. Jesus was concerned for the excluded and the outcast and was considered by the Gospel writers to be the one who was anointed to bring Good News – of God's love – to the marginalised. We have seen that happen this week in a big event in faraway USA, which – due to globalisation – seems much closer to Australia today than a century ago.

Here is another story about a faraway country, and what a bishop did unnoticed by the media. Aldo Etchegoyen of Argentina took seriously his role as a Christian. In 1976 Argentina came under military dictatorship. Around thirty thousand people disappeared in six years after this, and about two hundred women were imprisoned in Buenos Aires. Three Protestant women requested that the bishop would bring them Communion in prison. It was dangerous at the time, to have contact with political prisoners, but the bishop was not afraid of giving this service to the women. He wanted to share the love of Christ – who sets the prisoners free. Each time he tried to visit the women, the bishop was refused permission to see them. The bishop decided to keep a loaf of bread in the freezer that he would use at the time he would be allowed to serve Communion. to the incarcerated women. In 1983 Argentina returned to civilian democratic rule. The military dictatorship ended and the bishop was finally permitted to serve Communion

A Matter of the Heart

It has always been the concern of true religion to influence human behaviour. This has usually meant the growth of a rather complicated set of rules. In the case of the Hebrews there is no doubt that human behaviour was profoundly influenced by such rules.

Nevertheless, among the Hebrew prophets there came men of spiritual insight who saw more deeply into the problem and who considered that outward obedience was by no means all that was desirable. They were men who came to proclaim that it was the inner attitude of the heart that really mattered as regards human behaviour and in the sight of God.

This great theme was expounded supremely by our Lord Jesus Christ. With his unerring insight he was able to see deep within us, to see the springs of motive, to see the shams and disguises, to see the boasting and feeble excusing. Steadily he sought to make people aware of their instability of heart and their need for inner unity. Jesus taught a religion that started with the heart and with the springs of human action at a time when immense store was set by outward observance.

- He taught a religion of changed affections
- Christianity is not merely a set of dogmas
- It is primarily the recovery of a right relationship with God
- That is a matter of the heart.

in the prison. He used the bread that he had kept in the freezer. He remembered that the bread was hard. However, it could not be broken by dictatorship but only by the power of the love of Jesus Christ. The women were released from prison a few days later. The Uniting Church in Australia believes in the 'priesthood of all believers'. We are no bishops, but we all of us are called to bring Good News to the poor, to proclaim release to the captives, recovery of sight to the blind, and to let the oppressed go free. I pray for power, a lot of power, for the gentle, the caring, the merciful people in this world. Blessings, Corina
