

Biblical? (2)

Here are some more sayings that may seem to come from the Scriptures, but in fact don't.

'Spare the rod and spoil the child'. The Book of Proverbs says something slightly different. 'He who withholds his rod hates his son. But he who loves him disciplines him diligently.' (Prov 13:24)

'Foolishness is bound up in the heart of a child; the rod of discipline will remove it far from him.' (Prov 22:15).

'Do not hold back discipline from the child, although you strike him with the rod, he will not die. You shall strike him with the rod and rescue his soul from Sheol.' (Prov 23:13-14)

'The rod and reproof give wisdom, but a child who gets his own way brings shame to his mother.' (Prov 29:15)

Coming from a culture where corporal punishment was rejected, these are difficult verses for me. I don't approve of an adult using painful means to get a message across to a child.

'To thine own self be true' is not biblical. It is morally good advice to be true to yourself and not fall prey to self-deception. This saying and with its 'thine' make it sound like the English in which the King James Version was written. However, it comes from Shakespeare. In Hamlet. Polonius tells his son Laertes, "this above all to thine own self be true, and it must follow, as the night the day, thou cannot then be false to any man." Just before this, Polonius has another line that is sometimes thought to come from the Bible, 'Neither a borrower or a lender be.'

Love your Enemies

(Luke 6:27-38)

I have often heard it said, and it is common sense: "Love begins at home". We think love grows out in a series of concentric circles: our first commitment is to family, then we help extended family, friends and neighbours, then local community, then our nation, then the world. Last of all, we have no obligation to help 'enemies' those who actively wish or do us, or those we love, harm. Jesus thought differently. In today's Gospel reading he says "Love your enemies; do good to those who hate you; bless those who curse you..." and then he gives some examples and repeats himself "love your enemies, do good, and lend, expecting nothing in return". In another passage he is even more demanding, saying that you cannot be his disciples unless you hate your own "father, mother, wife, children, brothers, and sisters" (Lk 14:26). His reason for loving enemies? God himself "is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked" and you can only be his children if you are like God. Then he promises that such a 'golden rule' lifestyle would be generously rewarded with "a good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap", every day. Following Jesus means that we are to be like God who is generous and loving to all, all the time, without distinction. Loving family first can only be achieved by loving family second and putting God's love at the centre of our lives. But, if I view this as a commandment, I say to Jesus, "I can't do it!" - the simple truth is that I have enough difficulty loving those I love, let alone those I don't like. The key is when we discover the eternal truth that Jesus' way of love already lives in my heart. A life of following Jesus is simply taking the first few steps in growing into God's way of loving.
