

# HE IS RISEN

#### **MESSAGE FROM THE MANSE :** Salvation

Only faith is needed for 'salvation', we don't earn 'being saved' by doing 'good works', so our protestant tradition tells us. Salvation is one of the most important words in Christianity. But what does this word actually mean? It is a loaded word for many people. Being 'saved' is interpreted as going to heaven after we die. If we are not saved, we will end up in hell. Sinners go to hell, everyone sins, so going to heaven is only a possibility if sins are forgiven. In this way of thinking, Jesus is our Saviour. He died for our sins to redeem us, so that we can go to heaven. People of other faiths, who don't believe in Jesus, cannot go to heaven. Really?

The biblical meanings of salvation, saved and saviour are very different from these ideas. The words appear roughly five hundred times in the bible, both in the Hebrew Scriptures and in the New Testament. In the Bible, salvation is hardly ever about an afterlife. There is mention of life after death only in Daniel, the youngest book in the Hebrew Scriptures, written about 165 BC. The word salvation does not occur in it. In the New Testament, salvation is occasionally about an afterlife, but most of the time it is not.

The first biblical context of salvation is given in the story of the Exodus. The high point in Exodus is where they cross the Red Sea, and we can read "Thus the Lord saved Israel that day from the Egyptians." The people are liberated from economic, political and religious slavery. They are to daily remember this in words and in deeds. Israel was not to become like Egypt in any way!

The second context for salvation is the return of the people from exile in Babylon, where they were exploited as in Egypt. The second part of Isaiah describes this period. It says (45:17) "Israel is saved by the lord with everlasting salvation." God is saviour, and is present with the people, so they need not fear. God saves because the people are precious and honoured and loved. Salvation in here means return from exile – coming home.

The third context for salvation can be found in the Psalms, where

the word means: rescue, deliverance from danger, sometimes of an individual, sometimes of the nation. Danger often comes from enemies or 'the wicked'. Sometimes the psalmist prays to be saved from illness, or death, or 'the Pit'. There are no prayers asking for eternal life. We find texts like "The Lord is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear?" "Be a rock of refuge for me, a strong fortress to save me." "Save all the oppressed of the earth."

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These three meanings of salvation can be found in the New Testament as well: liberation from slavery, return from exile, and rescue from danger. To be saved is to be delivered/rescued from what troubles us. The result of being saved is a new kind of life, a life of trust, a life without anxiety. So, salvation is about deliverance as well as transformation – change. There are many other biblical texts and images referring to salvation as transformation. Isaiah 35 has some, like, "The dry land shall be glad, the desert shall rejoice and blossom... Waters shall break forth in the wilderness, and streams in the desert." "Say to those who are of a fearful heart. 'Be strong, do not fear! Here is your God.'" "Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, and the ears of the deaf unstopped, then the lame shall leap like a deer, and the tongue of the speechless sing for joy." Salvation will bring an end to sorrow.

The Gospels tell stories of Jesus restoring people to life. God is not a god of the dead, but of the living. "Let the dead bury their own dead." (Matt 8:22) Jesus said this about living people: we can be alive and yet dead. This saying also holds good news; there is a way of leaving the land of the dead. The movement from death to life is also in Paul, who writes about dying and rising with Christ, and entering into a new kind of life. In John, this is what 'born again' means. There are many examples of Jesus healing people. This too, is salvation, restoring to health and community, healing of the wounds of existence. New life. Salvation is personal. Yet, in the Bible it is also about how we live together in communities, societies and nations. Salvation is political as well as personal.

Page 3 What would global salvation, a saved humanity, look like? Exodus, the prophetic writings, Jesus, and Paul show a vision with two main components: a world of justice and peace. Biblical justice is most of all economic justice, concerning the basic necessities of life: land and food. Peace means peace of mind, peace with people we meet or live with. Peace in the Bible also means the end of violence and war. Ancient Israel knew violence by the ruling elite to keep the population in line; violence of wars, often caused by rulers wanting to conquer more land – and wealth. Ordinary people had no say in politics, but were often victim of high taxes, they could be conscripted, had animals stolen, or crops ruined by invaders resulting in famine. So, in Old as well as New Testament, salvation means there will be peace through justice, not by violence. Thousands of years later, we are in dire need of global salvation, I think you will agree. Following in Jesus' footsteps is a way to salvation. Christianity - at its best - offers personal salvation, that we may become the best we can possibly be. Our religion also offers a way to transform the world, for it to become a world of justice and peace (the Kingdom of God). Trust and be not afraid, the light of the

risen Christ is shining, and the Holy Spirit is at work in the world.

We gave "Mainstreet Shoes and Bags" a thank-you card (and some of my biscuits for their morning tea) as they have been saving empty shoeboxes for us for about 20 years. The local coordinator who picks up our finished boxes, says every time, that our boxes ae the nicest – we decorate every box with colourful contact. We are still short of some items for this year's boxes – marbles (about 700), tennis balls (50), small toys (dinky cars, yoyos skipping ropes, etc), and undies: 30 for 2 - 4 boys, 20 for 2 - 4 girls, 20 for 5 - 49 girls and 45 for 10 – 14 boys. As before, K mart is still the cheapest - \$5.50 for 7, look at each end of the racks where they are displayed. Bulk bags of tennis balls are also available there. Our thanks to Antonia who bought a heap of dinky cars off the internet - a good percentage of them were new. Thanks too to Keith who is still making wooden toys for us – small ones for the boxes and large ones for fund-raising. They are beautifully made and painted. We also need about 50 large bags with handles that Esma is making for us! I am going to miss the inter action with you all over this project. It has been a highlight in my life and has helped me to get to know you all. We will start packing about July/August. I will still personally keep up

a small fund-raising effort at the CWA marts, baking and selling my biscuits and sending the money raised to Samaritan's Purse to be used for their shoeboxes. If you have any interesting, new-looking items, pass them on to me and I will put them on my stall as well. ## Providing both physical and *living* water in Ukraine

Every day, the aroma of freshly baked bread filled Sergey's family bakery in eastern Ukraine. Together they delivered bread across their city amidst the backdrop of everyday sounds – the hum of traffic, the laughter of children playing, and the barking of dogs.



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When the frontline of war reached their town, Sergey and his family left behind all that they had, to seek refuge away from the conflict and the destruction of their home, their city, and their community. In the weeks that followed, a future without reliable water, electricity or food became their new reality. Despite the turmoil, Sergey was determined to be the difference between hope and despondency for his family and his fellow countrymen. He would travel outwards towards the conflict zone to assist in evacuating residents still trapped in their homes for fear of ongoing rocket fire. For months, Sergey's bravery saved hundreds of lives. When Samaritan's Purse Disaster Assistance Response Teams reached Sergey's town, they found the city's water sources destroyed by shelling. Sanitation/ Hygeine specialists drilled a borehole well to
