Lockyer News: Numbers have been down at our Services of Worship recently. When someone is away, for whatever reason, it makes quite a difference! EDITORIAL COMMENT: Just as the days pass by more quickly than we can sometimes keep up with, so we are constantly being challenged by change. Five words that fill me full of dread are: "You gotta download the App". It's not just technical change that we face though, the concern of how our churches will survive is constantly with us. As congregations dwindle, finances also tend to dwindle, and it is not just the upkeep of buildings that gets harder, we also need to cover the expenses of ministry. However, with careful planning and making use of opportunities that come our way, it is surprising what can be achieved. If we look back and see how our forefathers dealt with difficult situations, we can learn how much can be achieved just by giving it a go.

It is always hard to say goodbye to those who have died, but we can learn a lot at the funeral by listening to the stories of a life which often hadn't been a particularly easy one. Bob Ashfield, who had been a member at Wesley for many years, was one such person. I had only known him for a few of those, but had grown fond of him during the time I'd pick him up to bring him to church each Sunday. He had not had a happy childhood and was sent to Australia from England at the age of 12, in the care of a woman from the Salvation Army, who delivered him to an orphanage where he stayed until he was 15. He then joined the workforce, trying out many different jobs, learning many and different skills as he did so. His luck changed when he met Hazel, who became his wife and they went on to share 61 happy years together, supporting one another along the way, building their own home bit by bit, then living in it for 40 years. Bob always had a strong faith and was a lay preacher for 10 years. He held various church offices, pastoral visiting his favourite, making many hospital and home visits. He chose to move into Juniper when dementia meant it was unsafe to live alone. Being such a gentleman, he was a staff favourite, and he loved to see his family.

I'll now hand over to Betty Reed to dip into the past, remembering John Francis and how he made a difference to people's lives. Clare

My memories of Dr. John Francis by Betty Reed.

Tom and I first met John and Olwyn when they decided to semi retire to their holiday home in Goode Beach and started attending Wesley Church, Duke Street Albany. Olwyn's father was a Methodist Church minister and I had previously met Olwyn as a young girl with her father in the Wesley church offices in Perth. Olwyn was 10 years younger than I.

It was shortly after their arrival in Albany that the late Les Poole formed a group of musical friends that met once a month in various homes for a shared meal and musical evening. John and Olwyn were part of this group. They were lovely evenings with a lot of laughter especially when three of the ladies got together on the piano to play "tri-ettes", often complaining that each was playing the others notes!

John, as well as being a good friend helped us professionally when he saw Tom limping at the church. Tom had previously seen his regular doctor who recommended 2 Panadol 3 times a day (It was only Arthritis!!). John made an appointment for Tom at his surgery in Goode Beach. The outcome of this appointment was a referral to an Orthopedic specialist and his left hip replacement in December 2006.

In 1993 Tom and I were on holiday in the Eastern States. Whilst in Sydney we received a call from our Minister, The Late Rev Nick Stuurstraat informing us of Olwyn's sudden passing.

We were quite surprised when Dr. John returned from a medical conference in London, England, married to Maggie, a nurse who had lived in Albany but had returned to England when her husband passed away. Maggie was 10 years younger than John and, I believe John thought that she would outlive him. Unfortunately, she was diagnosed with "Motor Neurone disease" which led to her premature death in 2014.

John was a wonderful friend and Doctor.

<u>Serving with Excellence - a message from Samaritan's Purse</u>

Seven brave responders from Australia and New Zealand have joined the international response to bring urgent relief. We are working in Naypyidaw, the capital of Myanmar, which is near the epicentre of the deadly earthquake that struck on 28th March. Samaritan's Purse have deployed their largest Emergency Field Hospital, complete with operating theatres, and ER inpatient wards, a pharmacy and a lab,

offering critical care where it's needed most. Michelle, an ER doctor from NSW, will work on the frontline, triaging and treating earthquake-related injuries in a fast-paced, multicultural setting. Nurses Annette, Anne and



Olivia will serve in the inpatient ward, supporting patients through recovery, extending spiritual and emotional care while sharing God's love. A New Zealand nurse will assist with life-saving surgeries, while Christine, an emergency specialist from WA, is providing essential HR and administrative support on the ground.

With the city's water supply destroyed, Greg from NSW has joined the clean water team to restore access for thousands, preventing the spread of disease and restoring hope. A further six team members, five from Australia and one from New Zealand are set to join the ground response to also serve with their skills in Myanmar. Please pray earnestly for the people of Myanmar who are suffering and for our teams as they serve as the hands and feet of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ. As Scripture commands us, "Bear one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ" (Galatians 6:2)
