

passing public's attention in the process.

For me, the fascination of both the ABC and BBC versions of the program was the diversity and age of the pianists who performed,

varying from 9 years old to 102, along with the pathos of their varied stories that left one in tears of enjoyment at the end of each program.

There were people who had suffered deep trauma and grief in their lives; others had



wrestled with mental issues; still others who had triumphed over unbelievable physical and neurological handicaps, to suddenly emerge, through their playing, like beautiful flowers responding to the stimulus of spring growth.

At the end of it all, all I could think of was Pentecost. So here was a passive instrument, of itself communicating nothing, until someone made the keys sing. There was everything from traditional jazz, through to classical masterpieces of Beethoven, Chopin, Liszt and Mozart. Some were child prodigies, others were self-taught, with almost no musical knowledge, yet they made the instrument sing. The music of the piano required no words; no translation was necessary; children responded in spontaneous dance, completely uninhibited. People stopped in the midst of their busy rushing. They paused and drank in the magic before their eyes (and ears), then went on about their daily business. Each week one special performer was chosen to be a participant in a final concert that was quite profound.

Pentecost was like that. People who had little to do with each other; who came from different cultures; who shared no common language; suddenly found themselves asking the same question: "How is it that we each understand the other"? For me, that is the work of the Holy Spirit - just as those passing through a busy railway station were arrested in their tracks, by the sheer beauty unfolding before their very eyes, knowing that their world would never be

quite the same again.

For me, God moves in mysterious ways and for many who claim little or no faith, I hope "The Piano" moved them just a little to know that in compassion and empathy, great beauty can be found.

Pope Francis said "How it upsets me to see Christians remain passively uninvolved and actually say; 'It is up to God to change the situation.' "
