

On a more local note, Albany will be the host city for the National Model A Ford Meet from 18th-24th October 2026, as part of Albany's 200th Anniversary Celebrations of European settlement. We are very much part of the organisational logistics, with an anticipated 300 participants and 150 vehicles from all over Australia and overseas, so Albany will be part of our lives for some time to come.

As the second half of 2025 unfolds, we are very much into the Season of Pentecost. The key emphasis this year is the Gospel of Luke, with its numerous stories of the outreach of infant communities who were known as "Followers of The Way". The focus in July is Chapter 10, with the Mission of the Seventy; the Parable of the Good Samaritan; the visit of Jesus to Mary and Martha; concluding with Luke's version of the Lord's Prayer in Chapter 11 and the need for perseverance in prayer.

Each of the passages set for our worship are challenging, if not confronting. Many of us are in the twilight of our lives, rather than filled with the bold enthusiasm that may have been part of youthful zest in our earlier years. It would be understandable to think these Gospel challenges are for someone else, perhaps with more energy and enthusiasm than we have, but that would devalue the contribution we all can still make.

If we were in an earlier part of Luke's Gospel, we might recall in Chapter 2 Jesus is brought by Mary and Joseph to be presented in the Temple. It was there the faithful Simeon experienced a revelation that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. There is also present the prophet Anna, widowed at an early age, yet now at 84 never leaving the Temple, worshipping, fasting, praying day and night.

In short, those of age and deep religious conviction were very important in the scheme of things, for it was their wisdom that enabled them to recognise Jesus for who he would become. The story is not just a "one off", for we are all capable of being a Simeon

or an Anna, identifying those who have the presence of God in their young lives. Never for a moment should we think the task before us is too large or incomprehensible. God is not done with us yet!

them whilst they are still with us. This is a certificate that turned up amongst papers and cards as Doreen Keding sorted through her bits and pieces now that she has transferred to full care at Craig Care. She has received many certificates, awards and an Order of Australia medal during her 97

years but this was perhaps her first. It stated that having completed the Primary School Course she was now qualified to enter a course of higher education. However she grew up on a farm in S.A. too far away to embark on such a course, besides which, at 14 she was a capable and highly valued worker on the farm so her schooldays came to an end, but learning from her elders, mother, father, aunts and uncles, she made good use of every opportunity that came her way. In earlier times, the eldest child often had to leave school and find a job to provide some income for the family, whereas by the time I had finished primary school, I took the progression to further education very much for granted, with my parents encouraging me at every turn. As I thought about all the activities Doreen has been involved with, it became clear that they were generally linked to the giving of her time and talents in a caring and generous way, living out the way she learned from a young age, the ethics of Christianity. She is still very much involved in monthly church services at Craig Care, for as Rev Wes Hartley says "God is not done with us yet" She is a treasured friend, congratulations on a life well lived, Clare Ferry
