

This week our Lectionary reading takes us into Luke Chapter 11, Verses 1-13, which begins with Luke's version of the Lord's Prayer, then flows by way of example, into the story of the neighbour who knocks on the door at midnight, seeking food for a guest who has just arrived after a long journey. In essence it is a parable about insistence.



For me, today's Gospel is also about that which takes place each week in worship. The first verse tells us that after Jesus had finished praying, one of his disciples said to him: "Lord, teach us to pray, as John taught his disciples". Jesus responds "When you pray, say..." What unfolds is a litany of requests to God, just as we pray in our prayers for others. With Jesus, prayer was never an abstraction, nor was prayer isolated from the world in which he lived. It was integral to his life, even unto death. As we journey through the Gospel of Luke, we read that Jesus "would withdraw to deserted places to pray" (Luke 5:16). At other times "he went out to the mountain to pray and he spent the night in prayer with God" (Luke 6:12; 9:18). Jesus prayed before he chose his disciples (Luke 6:13-16) and when he fed the 5000 (Luke 9:16); he prayed the night before he died (Luke 22:39-44); and even from the cross itself (Luke 23: 34, 46). For Jesus, prayer was non-apologetic; it was persistent; it was shameless. In a world where hospitality was highly prized, the continuous and shameless knocking on the door at midnight, was in contrast to the great shame brought on the community by the householder who preferred to stay in bed, pretending to be deaf to answering hospitality's urgent need.

To my mind, today's Gospel places the onus of response to need in our community firmly on the life of this - indeed *any* Christian community. In effect we are in the role of first responders, called out at a moment's notice, when others are overwhelmed by tragedy, accident or medical emergency. Can we imagine what would happen if the first responders we all depend on suddenly decided it was too late; that they were too tired; that they simply could not be bothered?

That is the urgency of today's Gospel, where one of the disciples said to Jesus: "Lord, teach us to pray..." Nothing has changed in the intervening 2000 years. The question was asked. The answer was given. All we have to decide is if we are going to hear the persistent knocking, get up from our bed and open the door. For if we do, the possibilities are then quite endless.

Reluctant Obedience

Obedience as an important element in religious experience is an uncomfortable idea for us. We find service and worship easier. Service is what we do for the other and worship is the adoration we give to the God of Creation.

Obedience on the other hand is responding to what is asked of us. It involves hearing the voice of the Other against ourselves. It involves the call to do that which we are not doing. It asks us to be open to change, to adopt new priorities and sometimes to radically re-orientate our whole life's direction.

The art of relinquishment does not come easily for us, even when we are long convinced that the time has come to let go or to move on. We frequently languish in the familiar places, even when we have heard the distant voice.

Obedience is never simply a matter of saying 'yes'. That is not its most difficult element. Obedience is also saying 'no' to the familiar. While saying 'yes' to the unknown but possibly exciting future has the lure of adventure, saying 'no' to what is presently ours, even when we no longer fully appreciate what we have, is the most difficult feature of the art of obedience.
