

Uniting Church in Australia Albany Region Congregations

Today's Gospel has all the hallmarks of "fire and brimstone" sermons of former times: "I came to bring fire to the earth, and how I wish it were already kindled! I have a baptism with which to be baptised and what stress I am under until it is completed! Do you think that I have come to bring peace to the earth? No, I tell you, but rather division!" (Luke 12: 49-51)



In many respects religious writers of former times were not all that different to scriptwriters or playwrights in our own time. From the Hebrew Scriptures the Prophet Isaiah used the analogy of a vineyard, something quite familiar to us in these parts. "Let me sing for my beloved my love-song concerning his vineyard: My beloved had a vineyard on a very fertile hill. He dug it and cleared it of stones, and planted it with choice vines; he built a watchtower in the midst of it, and hewed out a wine vat in it; he expected it to yield grapes, but it yielded wild grapes. And now, inhabitants of Jerusalem and people of Judah, judge between me and my vineyard. What more was there to do for my vineyard that I have not done in it? When I expected it to yield grapes, why did it yield wild grapes?" (Isaiah 5: 1-4)

Isaiah's testimony was his declaration that God had given everything to his people, including the Promised Land itself, but when it came to assessing the yield of the vineyard it was only fit for the fire. What followed was a litany against a privileged people who abused power, bent the law to suit their own purposes, oppressed their neighbours, cared little for the poor and were closed to the word of the Lord. The Song of the Vineyard was an indictment and judgement after choices had been made - the bad grapes were evident for all to see; all that remained was a decision concerning what to do with the bad investment.

In light of the carnage we see nightly before us in Gaza, a key part of what was once described as "The Holy Land", the prophecy of Isaiah and today's Gospel from Luke 12 are as timely as any news broadcast. It ultimately all boils down to whether we are able to hear that Word - and respond.

The Choice

"Returning hate for hate multiplies hate, adding deeper darkness to a night already devoid of stars. Darkness cannot drive out darkness; only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate; only love can do that."

(Martin Luther King)

It seems so wrong to say that Jesus' came to fan the fires of family and social conflict and division, but those are his own words! He said, "I came to set the earth on fire". But didn't Jesus come to bring peace on Earth and goodwill amongst all people (Luke 2:14)? "No" is Jesus own answer in today's Gospel reading - "I came to bring not peace, but division", he said. How can this be? The key is to understand that Jesus knew that the fires of conflict would be kindled and lit by his own coming "baptism". This 'second' baptism (he had already been baptised into his life mission by John) was Jesus' death and resurrection. Jesus knew he would be 'frustrated' until his life was fulfilled by his death. But Jesus also knew that his death would light the fires of continuing conflict and division, Jesus could see the signs and knew what was coming. He was warning his friends that the fires that would soon consume him would also have consequences for them. They could look at the clouds, note the wind direction (or open an app) and know there was rain coming. "Why can you not see this coming conflict?" Jesus asks. Jesus' here teaches us that the choice for love and truth will also always be costly. because others will choose selfishness, hatred and lies. Jesus knew when we choose love we also kindle the fires of division and hatred. But there is a truth here that Jesus also taught - light is stronger than darkness, love is more powerful than hate, resurrection is stronger than death. Only you can choose for yourself. Will you 'take up your cross' and follow Jesus? Or in fear, loneliness and isolation choose your own desires for security, control and esteem? Jesus' wisdom is "Can't you see the signs? The 'meaning of the present time' is (always) an urgent call to choose love. So if you see darkness coming, you know what to do. The question is "Will you do it. Will you choose the light of love or the darkness of hate?'
