Message from Rev. Wes Hartlev

- Locum Minister (July-August 2025)

As you welcome back your Minister Rev Corina Van Oostende from her long service leave after spending time with her family in The Netherlands, I would like to wish our congregations at Wesley Albany, Lockyer, Denmark and Mt. Barker all the very best for the future, as you journey in worship and witness together.

I am quite taken aback by the energy you all exhibit in your commitment to the tasks set, from worship preparation, taking services, offering your musical talent and generally caring for each other through visitation and prayer. There is much to be thankful for.

We are all aware, sometimes painfully, that we are as susceptible as anyone else to the ravages of ageing. Fighting it, as we would prefer to do, still produces the same result. Some of the pain of ageing is looking back on the life of the Church as we once knew it, with plaques and photos in our congregational buildings highlighting Sunday School achievements, major choir events and success in musical competition, to name just a few. I can look back on the names of ministers past, most of whom I have known since my first arrival in WA in 1966. We give thanks for the saints who have gone before us.

Our Uniting Church is at something of a crossroads, as congregations dwindle and support in ministry is increasingly unattainable. "THE SPECIAL MEETING REPORT"

On Monday 25th August 2025 the Albany Regional Church Council had a meeting with the Presbytery personnel who represent "The Strategic Priority and Vitality Group" including Church Mission and Property. The representatives were as follows: Rev. Ana Leaaetoa (Group Leader) Rev. Luke Williams (Presbytery Minister for Mission) and Tim Fallows (the Executive Officer for Property).

The first meeting for the whole region started at 11.00am and the three questions asked, to set off discussion, were as follows:

- 1. Where is our church at the present time?
- 2. Where do we think the church feels God is leading us?
- 3. How can the Presbytery best support us at this time? Each group was able to discover their own God given strengths and how they could use them to support their congregation should the region not continue in the future with ministry as we know it. The fact that Rev Corina has talked about her plan to retire mid 2026 caused us to look ahead to plan the possibility of a part-time minister in the future and consider what this would look like as well as the availability of a supply part-time minister, should one be called. The part-time ministry is due to the fact that the income of the region has been reducing over the last two years, to the point that a full-time minister could not be afforded.

A break for some lunch and coffee at Duke Street was then made with much discussion continuing during that time.

At one thirty in the afternoon, the Presbytery Group then met with the AUC Executive for a discussion about the future, in particular, that of the Wesley church in Albany, taking into account the three questions and what had arisen from the earlier discussion. For Albany, a partnership with another Christian group was suggested and will be looked at by Rev Luke Williams. It was suggested that there would be great changes in our future ministry should we not be-able to grow as a congregation, or not be able to afford a part time ministry.
